View from the field

The West Kentucky 4-H Camp was buzzing with volunteers, cooking meals for first responders, sorting out massive piles of donations, weaving around pallets and pallets of bottled water. Nicole Blanzy, the camp director held an incessantly-ringing phone managing the logistical hub the camp had become. By the time I arrived on Dec. 21, the Boil Water Advisory for the area had just been lifted. But, the somehow still energetic Nicole told me that the tornado wasn't the first time they faced unsafe drinking water. Even during normal operations, 4-H campers have been sent home due to Boil Water Advisories. With limited recycling options and valuable space needed, storing pallets of bottled water just isn't a sustainable option. Now that won't be a problem.

On Dec.13, WaterStep, a Louisville-based nonprofit sent a team to western KY. As a long-time WaterStep volunteer, I knew they were a reputable avenue to help in disasters. So, I met up with them as they gathered before dawn in a Shepherdsville restaurant to fuel up before deploying to Mayfield and Dawson Springs. WaterStep provided disaster-ready mobile water treatment systems to areas that didn't have safe drinking water. The mini water treatment system left in the hands of the West KY 4-H Camp included an M-100 chlorinator (pictured above), a 500-gallon bladder tank, and a BleachMaker for disinfection and cleaning surfaces. That football-sized M-100 uses a handful of table salt to generate enough chlorine for thousands of gallons of water making it safe to drink! While the WaterStep team spent most of their time at a few other important sites (read more here: <a href="https://bit.ly/WaterStep-WKY">https://bit.ly/WaterStep-WKY</a>), I got to follow up and train Nicole, Camp Maintenance Supervisor Greg Russell, and volunteer Eden Elfrink how to make water safe to drink when the Boil Water Advisory inevitably returns.

While the tornado may be on everyone's mind, there is still plenty for which to be thankful this coming year. I hope you take note of the many opportunities to learn something new this January. I am particularly excited about the Small Ruminant Profit School starting soon! Come check it out and **Happy New Year!**

### How to Help in West KY

As I mentioned on the first page, last month I visited the communities hit hardest by the tornados in western Kentucky. While many people have been left wondering how to help, I was thankful that there was an opportunity for me to find myself useful. While there, I noticed two things as I looked for a recipient for donations that were loaded into my car before I left. I noticed the overwhelming generosity of our fellow Kentuckians and the overwhelming workload associated with getting donated resources to the places and people that need them most. Due to the challenges of distributing donated goods and warehousing them while recipients are found, we recommend that you think carefully about what, when, where, and how you donate. As the new year begins I am certain there will still be needs in West KY, especially as communities move from clean up to rebuilding. # How to get the most life from your Christmas tree



Live Christmas and holiday trees provide environmental benefits over artificial trees whether they are cut or dug. But give the earth a present this holiday season by taking it one step further: ensure you squeeze every bit of life from your live tree. So you've undecorated your tree...now what?

If you have a yard, **consider making it into a wildlife feeder**. Toss it in on the edge of the forest for deer to browse on, or stand it up outside and hang bird feeders from its branches until the needles fall off. Make easy homemade bird or wildlife feeders by spreading peanut butter on pinecones then dipping them in birdseed. Biodegradable string (cotton, jute, or hemp string, thread, twine) threaded with cranberries and popcorn works well too, and makes a great-looking garland! Birds, squirrels, rabbits, and insects will find shelter in and under the branches even if you don't add any feeders.

If you have a pond, **consider using your old tree for fish habitat.** Place the tree under the water level around the edge of the pond to create spawning habitat or shelter for smaller fish and invaluable invertebrates that keep the aquatic ecosystem healthy. Just remember, please don't dump your tree in public waterways or a neighbor's property unless you have permission. That is considered illegal dumping. Additionally, never place trees in open flowing streams as the habitat benefits do not outweigh the risk of causing problems with flooding, erosion, or trash and debris catching in the branches. If you don't have your own pond, bring your tree to one of the Department of Fish and Wildlife's Christmas for the Fishes drop-off sites through Jan. 15. You can also **have your tree mulched!** Bernheim Arboretum and Research Forest will be offering holiday tree recycling through

Jan. 31. Drop your tree off at the collection point at the turnaround on the left at the front gate to have your tree added to carbon stored in the soil, trees, and mulch at Bernheim.

Finally, you can **check with your local** sanitation provider to learn about a tree pickup. Some companies have special pickup days for trees that will be mulched or composted. Regardless, do whatever you can to keep your live tree an ecofriendly choice by ensuring that it doesn't end up in the landfill where it will produce methane as it decomposes in an oxygendepleted environment.

On that thought, consider recycling those frustrating old Christmas lights too-just not in your recycle bin, please! Call ahead, but most hardware stores accept lights to be responsibly recycled. You can also mail your old lights to Christmas Light Source, a holiday lighting company in Texas in exchange for a 10% off coupon and the good feeling that all proceeds from their recycling process are donated to Toys for Tots.

Christmas Light Source details:

- 1. Box up your old, broken Christmas lights into the smallest box that will accommodate the lights and send them in the cheapest and slowest way at:
  - Christmas Light Source Recycling Program 4313 Elmwood Drive Benbrook, TX 76116
- Please include your name and email address (mandatory if you want the discount code - they won't save or sell your information) and they will email you a code that will be good for 10% off a single order of Christmas lights (one rebate coupon per household).
- Then they take the lights, have them recycled, and take the proceeds from the recycling and use them to buy books, educational games, puzzles and toys to be donated to the DFW Marine Toys for Tots Foundation.

### Tap into Some Maple Syrup Resources!

This fall, the Kentucky Maple Syrup Project delivered several Kentucky maple syrup workshops. The workshops featured some nationally prominent maple syrup researchers and educators. While COVID, pushed the events online it did allow them to record and archive the workshops for later viewing. 




### What I'm reading:

### BROCCOLI POTATO SOUP

### **GROCERY LIST**

- Broccoli (need 4 cups chopped)
- Small onion
- Low sodium chicken or vegetable broth (need 4 cups)
- Evaporated nonfat milk (need 1 cup)
- Instant mashed potatoes
- Shredded cheddar or American cheese

### MAKE IT A MEAL

- · Broccoli Potato Soup
- Grilled cheese sandwich
- Grapes
- · Low-fat milk

### TIPS

- 1. Can make ahead and freeze into single servings.
- Broccoli makes this dish a great source of vitamins A and C.
- 3. Eat more vegetables, fruits, whole grains, and fat-free or 1% milk and dairy products. Make them the basis for meals and snacks.
- 4 cups chopped broccoli, may use frozen
- 1 small chopped onion
- 4 cups low sodium chicken or vegetable broth
- 1 cup evaporated nonfat milk
- 1 ½ cups instant mashed potatoes, prepared with water
- · Salt and pepper to taste
- 1/4 cup cheese, shredded cheddar or American
- **1.** Mix broccoli, onion, and broth in large sauce pan.
- 2. Bring to a boil.
- Lower heat. Cover and simmer about 10 minutes or until vegetables are tender.
- **4.** Add milk to soup. Slowly stir in potatoes.
- Cook and stir until bubbly and thickened.

- **6.** Season with salt and pepper; stir in a little more milk or water if soup starts to become too thick.
- 7. Ladle into serving bowls.
- **8.** Sprinkle 1 tablespoon cheese over each serving.



# ATTENTION ALL FARMERS!

DUE BY: JANUARY 1, 2022

AGRICULTURE EXEMPTION NUMBER NOW REQUIRED FOR TAX EXEMPTION ON FARM PURCHASES



A new Kentucky law requires that farmers apply for an Agriculture Exemption Number to make qualified purchases for the farm exempt from sales tax.

The deadline for applying for the new Agriculture Exemption Number for current farmers is <u>January 1, 2022.</u>

The application is currently available on the Department of Revenue website here:

https://bit.ly/KY51A800

The application requires verification of agricultural activity.

Any one of the following documents may be submitted with the application:

\*IRS Schedule F, Profit or Loss from Farming,

\*IRS Form 4835, Farm Rental Income and Expenses

\*Farm Service Agency number

\*Other type of verification

Once approved, the Department of Revenue (DOR) will issue an Agriculture Exemption Number by letter. The number must be renewed every 3 years.

### Winter Weather Safety

### **For Rural Communities**



Winter can bring with it a wide variety of potentially dangerous weather. From impacting travel, outdoor activities, infrastructure and more, being prepared for any eventuality can bring you and your family some peace of mind this winter season.





Snow or ice totals can vary over short distances. A heavy snow band may form, dropping more snow in one location, while significantly less snow falls just a few miles away.

Forecasts can change frequently, Forecasts may change as new model data becomes available, Always check for the latest information.

Know your winter weather terminology

Focus more on the winter storm's impacts, rather than focusing too much on exact numbers.

Rely on a dependable source for weather info. Choose your information sources wisely. Will there be rain, ice or snow? The graphic below explains how having different layers of warm and cold air between the clouds and the ground determines the type of precipitation that hits the ground.
(Blue = Below 32° F/Frozen precipitation;
Orange = Above 32°F/Liquid precipitation)



A great way to keep ahead of a winter storm is with NOAA Weather Radio (NWR), a small battery powered receiver that provides continuous broadcasts of the latest weather information from the nearest National Weather Service office. NWR broadcasts official Weather Service warnings, watches, forecasts and other hazard information 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.



### Winter Storm Watch

Issued when there is the potential for significant and hazardous winter weather usually within 48 hours.

Be Prepared!

### Winter Weather Advisory

Issued for any amount of freezing rain and/or snow that is expected to cause a significant inconvenience, but not serious enough to warrant a warning.

### Winter Storm Warning

Issued when a significant combination of hazardous winter weather (freezing rain and/or snow) is occurring or imminent.

### Prepare! Don't Let a Winter Storm Take You by Surprise!

### Before The Storm

When preparing for an Ice Storm:

Stock up on supplies such as:

- Candles, or a flashlight and batteries
- Battery powered NOAA Weather Radio
- Water and food, especially food that requires little preparation
- Extra medicine and first aid supplies
- Heating fuel
- Pet/livestock supplies

Move animals to sheltered areas. Windbreaks, properly laid out and oriented, are better protection

for cattle than confining shelters, such as sheds.

Haul extra feed to nearby feeding areas. Have water available. Most animals die from

dehydration in winter storms.

- Trim weak or damaged branches around the home
- Move items out from underneath trees

If traveling, prepare an emergency supply kit, including items like:





Water and anacka

Flashlight





First aid supplies

Snow shovel and brush





Warm clothes and blankets

## **During The Storm**

Concerning livestock...

To more efficiently conserve heat:

- Close off any rooms not in use
- Put towels or blankets in cracks under doors
- Keep blinds or curtains closed

### If traveling:

- Let someone know where you are going and what time you expect to make your destination
- Keep an emergency supply kit packed
- Check conditions along the route
- Check the latest forecast

### **After The Storm**

Check on your home and contact family and isolated neighbors

Stay informed on travel conditions and be aware of roadway hazards such as:

- Black ice, even if the roadway has been cleared of snow
- Potholes, which can be difficult to see and cause significant damage


